As humans, we are good at reading the faces of other humans and we can more or less identify what a human in pain looks like. Research shows that we are naturally drawn to the faces of animals when assessing their pain and that we have a good intuition about when an animal is clearly in pain. However, we are not very good at acting upon the more subtle signals or being sure about when to give pain relief. Indeed, sheep do show pain in their face. Recent research in this area has identified facial expressions of sheep that are present during painful disease.

A Sheep Pain Facial Expression Scale has been developed to be used by farmers and veterinarians to help identify and assess pain in sheep. The scale has been tested for its accuracy and reliability by scientists, and after minimal training other people are able to correctly identify sheep that are, or are not, in pain.
